The Florida Department of Health reports influenza activity levels have increased notably over the last few weeks. The Florida Department of Health is encouraging families to get vaccinated for influenza as soon as possible. Influenza vaccines are safe and the best way to protect against influenza and its potentially severe complications.

Influenza can cause mild to severe illness. Serious outcomes of influenza infection can result in hospitalization or death. Some people, such as young children, the elderly, and people with certain health conditions are at higher risk for serious complications from influenza. Some children are at especially high risk for influenza-related complications: children less than five years old, American Indian and Alaskan Native children, and children with chronic health problems.

While rare, influenza-associated pediatric deaths are reported each season, most often in unvaccinated children with underlying health conditions. Last season, six influenza-associated pediatric deaths were reported in Florida, and all six occurred in children who were not fully vaccinated. Influenza vaccination has been shown to significantly reduce a child's risk of dying from the For more information, please visit www.cdc.pov/flu/parents/index.htm.

The best ways to protect your child and your family during influenza season are to:

- Get vaccinated.
- Keep sick family members home.
- Contact your health care provider if you or your child are experiencing flu-like symptoms (common symptoms include fever, cough, sore threat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, and headache).
- Follow your physician's quitance on treatment.
- Take additional steps to prevent flu by staying away from people who are sick, frequently washing your hands with scap and warm water, and avoiding touching your eyes, nose, and mouth as much as possible.

Annual influenza vaccination is crucial for children with underlying health conditions including asthma, diabetes, heart disease, and neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions. Children less than six months old are too young to be vaccinated, which is why it is so important to make sure the people around them are vaccinated.

Influenza vaccines are offered in many locations including pharmacies, clinics, employers, and schools. Contact your physician or county health department, or visit Floridal lealth powlfindal lushot, to find a location offering influenza vaccines near you.

BREVARD SCHOOLS FOUNDATION HAS PARTNERED WITH FLORIDA KIDCARE

Brevard Schools Foundation has partnered with Florida KidCare to help low income students access quality, affordable medical and dental care. Below is a link to their Principal's Tool Kit which contains useful information that can be shared within your school communities. A few of the key points about the program are:

- Most families pay nothing at all for coverage, and many families pay just \$15 or \$20 a month.
- Families who are not eligible for subsidized coverage may purchase Florida KidCare at the full-pay monthly premium, which is competitively priced and child-centered compared to other options.
- To help Florida families interested in applying for Florida KidCare, a free online eligibility calculator is available. This tool utilizes two key pieces of information family size and annual household income to estimate a family's monthly premium payment for Florida KidCare coverage.

Medication Rules Florida Statutes 1006.062 and the Brevard County School Board




- 1. A separate Permission form must be completed for EACH medication given at school. Forms MUST be signed by the parent/guardian every year and given to the clinic nurse.
- 2. When completing Permission forms, please make sure that your instructions match the pharmacy label or manufacturer label.
- 3. <u>Clinic staff will not accept a medication if the label has been altered in any way.</u> Please DO NOT write on the pharmacy label.
- 4. All medications must be in the **ORIGINAL CONTAINER** with the manufacturer or pharmacy label in place. The medication must have a valid expiration date **and** the prescription must be current.
- 5. Medication in baggies will NOT be accepted or administered. This includes cough drops and over-the-counter (OTC) medications.
- 6. All medication will be counted upon arrival at school. The parent/guardian will initial to verify that the count is correct.
- 7. FOR YOUR LEGAL PROTECTION, PLEASE DO NOT ALLOW YOUR CHILD TO TRANSPORT ANY MEDICATION TO/FROM SCHOOL.
- 8. OTC medications will remain in the clinic for 10 days, then, discarded. Age-appropriate doses will be given as directed by the manufacturer's label. If a longer time period or a dose change is needed, written physician authorization is required.

SLC HOMEROOM NEWS

7th grade

It's a new year and a new curriculum for our SLC classes. 7th grade students and their advisors are in the midst of quite a few changes to meet the State Mandated 10 hours of Mental Health Education. This is a new requirement for all public school students in grade 6-12 in the state of Florida.

Brevard County has rolled out a series of discussion-based lessons through a computer application called the Everfi Character Playbook. Students can expect to learn about Healthy Relationships, Understanding & Managing Emotions, Healthy Decision Making, and a variety of mental health topics that are focused on giving young people the tools for positive coping strategies for achieving/maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Students will also feel a wealth of support from their teacher/advisors, administrators, and guidance counselors should they feel the personal need to connect with the adults who care for them at school.

So when you ask your child what did they do in Homeroom (on Fridays), there should be plenty of talking points to share with them!

Class of 2024: We are working through our required curriculum and having fun doing it. Once again, Our theme is "Aspirations" for this year. Please continue to get your student's service hours done and turned in to their homeroom teacher. The 8th grade homerooms will be following the same Mental Health curriculum as explained above.

9th grade

9th grade homerooms will begin the state mandated mental health curriculum this semester. During homeroom sessions not used for mental health, we will have a Tribond tournament against other 9th grade homerooms. Tribond is a lateral thinking game which asks students to figure out how three words are connected. If the question is shoe, mail, lunch, the answer is box.

The 10th grade homeroom classes are getting ready for the Mental Health courses as mandated by Florida's Governor. Each homeroom teacher will be working with their students by leading discussions and allowing for reflective thinking time. These workshop sessions will begin January 24 and last through the next several months. **10th** Homeroom teachers will also be discussing the upcoming course registration options to help students develop their schedules for 11th grade.

Guidance counselors will be coming into English classes on February 24 for students to formally select classes for their JUNIOR year!!

11th grade

The Junior class has been very busy. In homeroom we have started a mental health curriculum. The first two lessons covered mental disorders; their symptoms and what to look out for with friends. Next we will be learning about healthy coping skills and how to seek help.

Juniors are actively fund raising and preparing for Prom. Two fundraising events for Prom ar the BLAST soap sales and Matchomatics. Prom will be held at the Hilton Rialto and we are working on finalizing the details. 100+ service hour logs are due by March 13th at the latest.

I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some interesting statistics on West Shore's attendance for August 2019 to January 2020. Out of the 928 students enrolled, 914 students have had at least 1 or more absences in 1 or more periods. With 8,101 excused absences and 19,539 unexcused absences for a total of 27,640 total absences. Our students know that when they miss a day or even a class period they fall behind and many times struggle to get caught up on the missed content. Therefore, with Spring Break over one month away please be sensitive to your student's attendance. It might be tempting to take a few days off here and there, however, those days add up quickly. Even more importantly when a student is not in school they miss valuable instructional time which can put them behind. Help us help them by keeping absences, tardies and check outs to a minimum.

Head Lice Prevention and Control Head Ico




Head lice are spread most commonly by direct headto-head (hair-to-hair) contact. However, much less frequently they are spread by sharing clothing or belongings onto which lice have crawled or nits attached to shed hairs may have fallen. The risk of getting intested by a louse that has fallen onto a carpet or furniture is very small. Head lice survive less than 1–2 days if they fall off a person and cannot feed; nits cannot hatch and usually die within a week if they are not kept at the same temperature as that found close to the scalo.

The following are steps that can be taken to help prevent and control the spread of head lice:



Avoid head-tohead (hair-to-hair) contact during play and other activities at home, school, and elsewhere (sports activities, playground, slumber parties, camp).

Do not share
combs, brushes,
or towels. Disinfest
combs and brushes used by
an infested person by soaking them in hot water (at
least 130°F) for 5-10 minutes.





Do not lie on beds, couches, pillows, carpets, or stuffed animals that have recently been in contact with an infested person.

Machine wash and dry clothing, bed linens, and other items that an infested person wore or used during the 2 days before treatment using the hot water (130°F) laundry cycle and the high heat drying cycle. Clothing and items that are not washable can be dry-cleaned OR sealed in a plastic beg and stored for 2 weeks.





Vacuum the floor and furniture, particularly where the intested person sat or lay. However, spending much time and money on housecleaning activities is not necessary to avoid reintestation by lice or nits that may have fallen off the head or grawled onto furniture or clothing.

Do not share clothing such as hats, scarves, coats, sports uniforms, hair ribbons, or barrettes.



Do not use furnigant sprays or fogs; they are not necessary to control head lice and can be toxic if inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

At your first teacher meeting, bring your child's state test results and ask what they mean for this year. Find out what's expected of your child and how you can support at home. Help the teacher get to know your child by sharing their interests and strengths as well. You can also share what you learned from the Readiness Check.

3 Make It Fun

You are the expert on your child and can help make learning exciting! Read together, choosing topics that interest your child. Find math in everyday life and turn it into a game. These small learning moments add up to a lot!

4 Celebrate Effort

Help your child see that hard work is what leads to success. Focus on effort and what your child is learning. This will help your child feel less nervous about new tasks or subjects.

5 Support Life Skills

Strengths such as communication, problem-solving, and confidence will help your child in school and life. Talk openly with your child about how they feel and how they handle situations, especially the tough ones.

Please communicate this information to all building occupants and their legal guardians,

Our records indicate that no asbestos removal activities or any other type of asbestos response actions have taken place at West Shore Jr./Sr. High School during the past year (July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018).

Background Information

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires all accredited school districts to provide building occupants with a yearly correspondence describing any/all asbestos materials removed from each school during the past year.

The EPA Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) of 1986 required an asbestos inspection of each school facility nationwide. This inspection was completed in 1988. The scope of the survey included sampling building materials that might contain asbestos, assessing the condition of the materials, performing laboratory analysis of each sample, and writing a comprehensive report called an Asbestos Management Plan.

The Management Plan document and subsequent Three-year Reinspection documents are on file at the school Administration office. These documents are available to the public for review.



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BREVARD PUBLIC SCHOOLS 5517.01 POLICY AGAINST BULLYING AND HARASSMENT

In response to changes made to Florida Statute 1006.147, that became effective July 1, 2013, Brevard Public Schools has updated School Board Policy 5517.01 that prohibits bullying, harassment, teen dating violence, and abuse. The policy ensures that all students, employees, and volunteers learn and work in an environment that is safe, secure, and free from harassment and bullying of any kind.

Florida Statute 1006.147 defines bullying to include cyberbullying and means systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees and may involve but is not limited to chronic teasing, social exclusion, threat, intimidation, stalking, including cyber-stalking, physical violence, theft, sexual, religious, or racial harassment, public humiliation, and destruction of property.

Cyberbullying means bullying through the use of technology or any electronic communication, which includes, but is not limited to, any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or in part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic system, photo-electronic system, or photo-optical system, including, but not limited to, electronic mail, internet communications, instant messages, or facsimile communications. Cyberbullying includes the creation of a webpage or weblog in which the creator assumes the identity of another person, or the knowing impersonation of another person as the author of posted content or messages, if the creation or impersonation creates any of the conditions enumerated in the definition of bullying. Cyberbullying also includes the distribution by electronic means of a communication to more than one person or the posting of material on an electronic medium that may be accessed by one or more persons, if the distribution or posting creates any of the conditions enumerated in the definition of bullying.

Harassment is defined as any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gesture, use of data or computer software, or written, verbal or physical conduct directed against a student or employee that: places a student or employee in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person or damage to his or her property, has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities, benefits or has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of a school.

Bullying and harassment also encompasses retaliation against a student or school employee by another student or school employee for asserting or alleging an act of bullying or harassment. Reporting an act of bullying or harassment that is not made in good faith is considered retaliation. Perpetuation of conduct is listed in the definition of bullying or harassment as causing an individual or group with intent to demean, dehumanize, embarrass, or cause emotional or physical harm to a student or school employee by incitement or coercion, accessing or knowingly and willingly causing or providing access to data or computer software through a

computer, computer system, or computer network within the scope of the district school system and/or acting in a manner that has an effect substantially similar to the effect of bullying or harassment.

Cyber-stalking, as defined in Florida Statute 784.048(1)(d), means to engage in a course of conduct to communicate, or to cause to be communicated, words, images, or language by or through the use of electronic mail or electronic communication, directed at a specific person, causing substantial emotional distress to that person and serving no legitimate purpose.

Florida Statute 1006.148(1)(a) prohibits dating violence and abuse by any student on school property, during a school-sponsored activity, or during school-sponsored transportation.

West Shore Jr./Sr. High School is committed to providing a safe learning environment and will not tolerate bullying or harassment of any kind. Incidents of bullying or harassment can be reported to the principal or any administrator. Anonymous reports can also be made by calling the Speak-Out Hotline at 1.800.423.8477.
