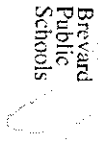

How are parents and families informed of their rights?	Brevard Public Schools Office of Title I provides all Title I schools with a brochure informing parents of their rights. This brochure is sent home with all students via backpack. Schools are also required to have a copy of the "Parents Right To Know" letter in a parent and family engagement notebook kept in the front office. The district Title I office monitors and keeps documentation of this on file.
What barriers will you address to encourage parents/families to attend?	Parent and families that were unable to attend Columbia's Title 1 presentation are given the opportunity to review the content and provide feedback through our school website. A general email was sent home letting parents know how to find the presentation with step-by-step instructions. This information was also included our weekly newsletter. Translations for the meeting were provided using Google Translate.
How will you get feedback from parents and families about the meeting?	Families are provided a survey/exit slip at the end of the meeting, allowing them the opportunity to provide feedback. Feedback forms were sent home with students who were unable to attend so that parents still have the chance to provide feedback. They may also contact the Title 1 school site coordinator by phone or email.
How do parents and families who are not able to attend receive information from the meeting?	Parents who are not able to attend are encouraged to call the school and speak with the Title I contact in order to receive the information presented. We will offer opportunities throughout the week for parents to get a condensed version of what they may have missed, in a smaller setting. Information is also posted via our website.

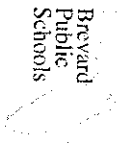
<p>Title I- Professional Development</p>	<p>Columbia Elementary teachers, the district K-12 Parent Involvement Resource Teacher, the Title I Family Involvement Resource Teacher and office of Educational Leadership & Professional Development staff work collaboratively to provide school staff with professional development in working effectively with parents.</p>
<p>Title II-ESOL</p>	<p>Columbia Elementary teachers and staff work together with our ELL department staff to provide translations for meetings and documentation to strengthen communication between non-English-speaking families and staff when possible. Our ESOL contact works with our ELL teachers to ensure that they translate information into the native languages of our students based on the L306 FOCUS report as well track accommodations that are being made in the classroom.</p>
<p>Title IV-Well-Rounded Education/School Safety/Educational Technology</p>	<p>Columbia Elementary teachers, Technology Associate, and the District Office of Education Technology work together to address the needs of students and families. We work together collaboratively to plan and implement appropriate programs, services and training opportunities for school staff and families, including opportunities to access and utilize FOCUS as a means of communication between home and school. Threat Assessment and Safety Team makes sure that safety concerns are addressed.</p>
<p>Title IX-Homeless</p>	<p>Since the number of homeless students in our county has increased significantly over the past few years, our office clerk, social worker, and guidance counselor work closely together to identify families that are in transition. These staff members and the district Homeless Liaison work collaboratively to meet the varying needs of the identified youth and families, without duplicating services, to ensure that their needs are met. All teachers were also trained this year on the McKinney-Vento Act to have a better understanding of our homeless students.</p>
<p>FDLRS/ESE services</p>	<p>To ensure our teachers and staff are meeting the needs of our students with IEP's or 504's, we have coordinated with our ESE team and/or FDLRS and Student Services Program Support to provide training opportunities for our staff. We will have monthly ESE meetings to make sure the needs of our students are best being met. We continue to implement an inclusion model at Columbia; therefore, an information/planning meeting was held prior to school beginning for proper ESE scheduling and services for those students.</p>
<p>Preschool Programs (Head Start/VPK)</p>	<p>Our Title I staff will invite area preschools to age-appropriate parent workshops that are offered at Columbia that may assist them in fully participating in the education of their children. Parents and their preschool children who will be attending kindergarten next year will be able to observe a kindergarten class and will be given a tour of the Columbia school facility.</p>

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SAC	Our School Advisory Committee meets monthly to discuss the needs of our school, set goals, and implement strategies to achieve them on a school wide level.
PTO/PTA	Columbia Elementary currently does not have a PTO/PTA.
Community Agencies/Business Partners	We currently partner with WaWa, Texas Roadhouse, Kona Ice, Dunkin Donuts, and Dominoes. Columbia collaborates with Children's Home Society for counseling services. The Children's Hunger Project provides food that we send home with our students on Friday's so that they have food for the weekend. Columbia also gets school supplies, clothes, etc. from local churches. In addition, Columbia has partnered with Boy Scout Troop 732 to beautify our campus with a new butterfly and rock garden.

To ensure meaningful and ongoing communication with all stakeholders, Columbia Elem. uses our School website, marquee, Facebook, FOCUS, school/classroom newsletters (Smore), teacher emails, flyers, and Blackboard Connect.

Letters are sent home with every student that has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is out of field. A copy of the letter and a list of the parents who receive the letter is kept on file as documentation for auditing purposes.
Explain how families are provided information regarding the curriculum, achievement levels, progress monitoring and assessments.	During our Open House, parents can visit their students' classrooms. The teacher provides ongoing information on the curriculum, state standards and assessment plans via classroom newsletters. The principal goes over the school's progress, achievement levels, etc. before parents visit with the teachers during Open House.
Describe how your school provides information to families in their native language. What languages do you provide?	Columbia Elementary translates documents using Google Translate to help us in informing families in their native language. We provide Creole and Spanish translation options. Translation equipment is available for general meetings, if requested. Translation services for other languages are made available through the Title I district office as necessary upon request. Staff members who speak Spanish are available to teachers and staff to assist in communication with parents if needed and may be available to attend Parent workshops/activities and conferences.
