

New Violins!

Mr. Yoh just received new violins! This means big changes to the music program at Stevenson. Now, all 3rd Graders will be learning to play the violin. The violins were provided through a grant by the Phoenix Foundation and that means more students will get a chance to learn how to play. I got a chance to interview Mr. Yoh about violins and music

Mr. Yoh, how do you feel about the changes to the music program? I am excited for both band and strings art wheel sessions. There are lots of opportunities to learn how to play an instrument for those in 3rd-6th grade. Every 3rd grader will get a chance to learn the violin. Kids in 1st and 2nd grade will learn about the instruments.

Do you think 3rd graders will continue to take violin throughout their time at Stevenson? I hope that students will take at least 2-4 years of violin lessons so that they can join an ensemble in middle school. It is a great opportunity to learn violin, but students will need to have some grit and persevere.

Do you think the violin program has affected any other music programs? Orchestra membership has increased. More kids also want to take band. There are more than 50 students in strings and 100 in band. Music helps students in other areas of their studies, like foreign language, math, and science too.

Do you have any suggestions to parents or students about how to treat the violins? Treat the violins with care. Use a soft cloth to clean it. Loosen the bow after practice. Don't leave it in your car. Don't expose it to heat or cold for too long. Never leave it outside.

Would you encourage more people to try violin? Yes, every student should be exposed to some sort of music in their life.

Do you like the new violins? Yes, they are beautiful and state of the art. There are ¾, ½, and full size violins. We also got 4 brand new cellos. They were all provided by the Phoenix Foundation.

What makes them different from the old violins? They are brand new and the best quality. Some of the old violins are from when the school first opened 20 years ago. They are a great addition to the orchestra.

Are you excited to teach violins again? Yes, orchestra is a passion of mine.

How much do you think kids should practice their violin? At least 20 minutes 3 times a week plus the time in class.

How long have you been a music teacher? 35 years.

How long has there been a violin program? 20 years.

How many new violins did you get? 26

How many violins do you have now? 90-100. At least 70 violins in addition to violas, cellos, and bass violins

Do you want to tell parents or students about the violin program? Pursuing strings is an excellent way to build grit and confidence. Try to persevere to learn something new. Don't be afraid to make a mistake.

From Our Grade Levels....

<u>Kindergarten</u>

Kindergarten is off to a great start! We are making new friends and learning to be good citizens. In Science we have learned what a scientist is and have practiced being a scientist conducting experiments. Our favorite was the M&M experiment! In ELA we have learned about work stations and have been exploring literature and concepts of print. In Math we are learning to write numbers and find hidden partners.

First Grade

What an exciting year we have planned for first grade! Our first class project showed that you have chosen to shine this year. The timelines came in and they were

PHENOMENAL! Thank you for encouraging your student to work hard on presenting their timeline too. We are working on completing our 1st IReady diagnostic for both Reading and Math. We are looking forward to reviewing those scores with the students and helping them identify their strengths and challenges as well as set some goals for themselves. Thank you for helping us grow and learn together.

Second Grade

Second graders are back in action! We are mastering classroom and school policies and procedures while using strategies to problem solve through Conscious Discipline. Every class has been getting to know their students strengths and weaknesses through running record assessments, IReady Diagnostics for reading and math, and small group lessons. We are conducting morning meetings that help us get to know each other while building character. In math, we have been learning strategies for addition and subtraction and incorporating those strategies with measurement. In science we have covered observations, severe weather, and we are currently learning about basic needs and habitats of living things. In social studies, we have learned about sources that teach us about history and will continue learning about what makes a good citizen through this first nine weeks. We love that students are enjoying their weekly reading journals and look forward to reading their reflections on what they are reading.

Third Grade

The beginning of the school year started with a bang! We have spent many days learning new routines and procedures with our new reading curriculum. We are also hard at work on simple multiplication and division equations. Keep practicing at home!

At the end of August, students took the i-Ready Reading Diagnostic. This diagnostic tested on phonics, high frequency words, vocabulary, and comprehension of both literature and informational text. 78% of our student scores came back on, or above, third grade level. Way to go! We expect that percentage to go even higher when all of our third grade friends have finished testing. Students will be taking the i-Ready math diagnostic in September and we are looking forward to reviewing those scores soon. Keep reading and working on those math facts to help every student achieve success!

Sixth Grade

<u>6th Grade English Language Arts</u>- Students have been working diligently on the first Unit of Study of the Savvas MyPerspectives program and tackling the question "How do our communities shape our experience of growing up?" Through multiple reading and writing experiences, students have considered this question from different angles and perspectives. Students have also completed the first iReady Diagnostic, and the results are promising in setting up students for success for the rest of the school year.

<u>6th Grade Social Studies</u>- Our study of the ancient world began with a look at the roots of human life and the beginnings of civilization. The students learned about scientists who examined fossils and bones left by the earliest hominins. These early hominin groups migrated from Africa to other parts of the world, and over time, these early people learned to grow crops. The first human settlements developed in regions where people found the resources needed to survive. Our next adventure will be taking us on a learning path about more complex cities or civilizations. The students will explore in depth that *a civilization is a society that has developed arts, sciences, and organization.*

<u>6th Grade Science</u>- Students are learning to identify and describe changes in position, direction, and speed of an

object when acted upon by unbalanced forces. They are learning that unbalanced forces do not always cause an increase in the motion of an object. Unbalanced forces cause changes in motion. This can include bringing an object to rest, decreasing the speed of an object, or changing the direction that an object is traveling. Balanced forces can be acting on an object moving at a constant speed and direction. Additionally, objects that have balanced forces acting on them are not necessarily at rest. An object can have balanced forces acting on it and still be in motion. Once our studies with forces and gravity are finished, we will start learning about the **Conservation of Energy.**

<u>6th grade Math</u>- Students are currently learning how to add (+), subtract (-), divide (/), and multiply (x) decimals. This includes whole number +-x / with decimals, decimal +-x / with other decimals, and mental math using power of 10 with decimals. Starting next week, the students will learn about variables such as writing expression with variables, properties of addition and multiplication using variables, the distributive property, and writing equations using one variable.




From Our Grade Levels....

Fifth Grade

Our math students are starting out this school year ahead of the district's math scores. Our students scored an average of 88.1% above the District's average of 73.2 on the Mid Module 1 Assessment. Way to go Penguins! Have you seen our Math-Google Classroom? Ask your student to show you!

"iReady Reading Diagnostic has been successfully administered and I am reviewing results. This diagnostic is key in helping me set up small groups, a component of our new curriculum, as well as in helping me determine who needs additional interventions and which interventions are needed. I have begun to meet with each child to review the results, explaining the score and discussing the subcomponent categories results as well as where they are now and where they are expected to be at the next administration midyear (no date set yet). When your child shares his or her score with you, you can determine if (s)he is at grade level by knowing that the grade level score range for 5th grade is 581-640. Overall, all students in GR5 break down this way:



A few students were absent and will make it up upon return. Some students scored well above grade and are included in the 43%. The above chart covers 99% of the ELA students. "
