The Horticulture Club

The Horticultural Club continues to make progress. The big news this month was the addition of the raised bed garden. This new garden was constructed from supplies donated by Jo-Ann Principi. Jo-Ann is a Financial Advisor as well as the owner of Fruit Creek Farm. She donated the supplies simply out of the kindness of her heart. This garden allows us to expand our gardens with a new Florida Native Flower Garden and two new vegetable gardens. Thank you, Jo-Ann!

In other news, we are just about ready to fire-up the hydroponic gardens. We have about 100 lettuce seedlings waiting to be transplanted. We also had a "will it grow challenge" where students planted things from their homes to see if they will grow. We planted grape seeds, peppers, potatoes, kiwi, and star fruit. Stay tuned for updates! We have also restarted the compost piles and the worm farm.

The future is also bright! We are looking to add another raised bed garden constructed from used pallets! We hope to use this for peppers and larger vegetable plants such as cucumbers, squash, and other viny plants.

If you are looking to donates supplies, we could use organic potting soil, black cow manure, peat moss, and cypress mulch. If you are looking to join, contact Mr. Hattal for an application form.

The Gifted Program October Update

Our Gifted Program is operating on all cylinders. With most of the early year testing in the books, we have settled into a routine. Each grade level is taking on separate community projects. Students are learning about coordinating with exterior agencies, addressing the limits of our reach, and getting the best out of limited resources. Additionally, some of our grade levels are participating in the Wonder Project. The Wonder project allows students to research topics of their choosing. They then present their findings to the entire class. This project allows students to develop questions, determine the authenticity of research sites, and prepare and present projects.

The future holds a lot of exciting opportunities for school. Last year, having adopted "every child is gifted philosophy", we are planning several school-wide projects to help engage students outside of the gifted classes. Our next project will be the Egg Drop Challenge II. Look for instructions and requirements soon. We are also planning on two other school-wide projects later in the year.

From Our Grade Levels....

First Grade

1st Grade is growing!! We are learning about the basic needs of living things. We are investigating plants and their properties. We are planting seeds and experimenting with plants. The kids are loving the hands-on projects! In social studies we are identifying celebrations and national holidays to remember and honor heroism and achievements of the people, and events, in our nation's ethnic heritage. In math we begin Module 2. I can't wait to see how they feel when they start adding three addends! It's such a big deal, and the looks on their faces are always priceless. In our new Benchmark Curriculum the kids are learning about fables, possessive nouns, proper nouns, narratives, and much more. We recently took the Unit 1 Assessment. We were ecstatic with the results that surpassed the district scores in every domain! Hooray for First Grade!!

Grade Five

Math-Once again our Penguins outshine the district on the End of Module 1 Math Assessment. The district average is 64.8% and our students averaged 84.75%! I am so proud of their hard work. Currently, we are working in Module 2, and the End of Module Assessment is scheduled for October 27, 2021. Videos and powerpoints are posted to our Google Classroom for any student that is absent, needs a review or wants a preview of each day's lesson. Please remember to spend 45-60 minutes each week on your iReady Math Path.

Science-This 9 weeks the 5th graders took two district Science assessments: Water Cycle and Forms of Precipitation. Our students exceeded the district average on both of these assessments. On the Water Cycle assessment our school mastery was 85% compared to the district's 57%. On the Forms of Precipitation assessment our school mastery was 99% compared to the district's 90%. Second Grade

We are in full swing here in 2nd grade and getting excited about our fall learning. We have some fun activities planned for the upcoming Mad Scientist Day. In Reading and Writing we are focusing on how characters face challenges with several different fiction stories and writing opinion essays about what we think of a character. In math we just finished up Module 3 on Place Value and heading right into Module 4 full of strategies for adding and subtracting 3-digit numbers. In Science we are having fun with experiments and videos on the basic functions of our major body systems. We have taken a resting pulse and one after doing jumping jacks to understand our heart and blood. We will be doing wall sits to understand muscles and putting tape around our fingers and trying to pick things up to find out how helpful our skeleton is. Social Studies begins our Unit on "The first Americans" learning about all the different Native American tribes and how where they lived affected how they lived. We are ready for a great 2nd nine weeks!

From Our Grade Levels....

Greetings families,

We are delving into the second quarter with a full agenda of learning targets that will provide rigor and exciting content. For Math, we are progressing into Module 3 which serves as a foundation for multiplication and division with larger numbers. When the students master these skills, they will feel such pride as this is a vital Math concept that they will carry on with them and utilize in a plethora of ways. For Reading, we are concluding our Literature unit on character analysis and development and will then transition into a nonfiction unit with a focus on government in action. In relation to Science, we will be moving onto flowering plants soon, and will need lilies to dissect, so please email Mrs. Albright at lund.shannon@brevardschools.org if you can assist with this grade level activity.

Science Fair is now coming to the forefront, so please pay close attention to the timeline that was sent home with your child. Their questions are due October 18th. To ease the students into Science Fair, we will be conducting a class Science project to help them become familiar with the Scientific Method next week.

Many students in 4th grade are completing the Wonder project with Mr. Hattal and it has been such an amazing experience for our students to take ownership of a project that they are genuinely intrigued with. Please encourage them and have a reflective discussion with them about their topic.


27th is Green for Mental Health Awareness Day. Wear a green shirt to bring awareness to mental health and mental health issues.

Access to Resources and Services in the School Library Media Program



Your school has a wonderful room that houses information on lots of topics, with something special for everyone. That room is the library media center. In it you will find what our school board recognizes as "the center" of the educational program of the school. It provides materials and services that meet academic, technical, personal and social needs of the school community." In meeting these needs, the media selection policy makes available a wide range of materials on varying levels of difficulty, with something to appeal to everyone. Many religious, ethnic, and cultural groups are represented in the school library, and specific criteria are used in considering items to be included. Because libraries are forums for information and ideas, books are provided for the interest and enlightenment of all students and teachers.

Many of these books are on various reading program lists, such as Sunshine State Young Readers' Awards, Accelerated Reader, Reading Counts, and Florida Teens Read. Some of these lists also include recommended reading levels. These reading levels are determined by companies that are selling the book product, and they do not necessarily reflect the appropriate chronological age, developmental age, maturity level, or family values for all students.

As with all other aspects of a student's education, parents are encouraged to be involved in a student's book selections. The books in the media center, whether part of a specific reading program or not, are available for the review of all patrons, but are specifically recommended for none.

Since reading is vital to success in our world, and since we know that the best readers are those who have parents that are involved in their education, we encourage parents to read and review the books your student selects. Come in and visit. Browse the collection of your school media center. You may find just the right book to share with your child.




