


# **IMPRESSIONIST**

#### Sixth Grade

In math, sixth grade wrapped up chapter one. The grade level average was 79.3%. We are currently working on chapter two which includes multiplying and dividing fractions, and adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing decimals.

In ELA, sixth graders are working on defining unfamiliar vocabulary words utilizing context clues, prefixes, and suffixes. We are also fine-tuning our ability to summarize an informational text and determine the central idea of that text. Currently we are on chapter 5 of Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief. In regard to iReady, we are asking students to complete a minimum of 2 lessons from their personal pathway each week.

For social studies, students recently completed a DBQ on Hammurabi's Code. For science, students are learning about the different types of energy and forces.

#### **Kindergarten**

Kindergarten had so much fun finishing their five senses unit in science. They learned how to take notes after making observations, and celebrated the end of the unit by cooking apple sauce in class. They are using literature to learn how to demonstrate characteristics of being a good citizen at home and school. They are finding evidence from the text to answer writing prompts, and showing their answers with detailed pictures and kindergarten spelling. They are learning about Spanish heritage month by reading Spanish authors and books of Spanish heritage. They were excited to use computers to do i-ready lessons for the first time. In math, they are practicing how to write numbers and understand the relationship between numbers and quantities. They learned how to use counters to show word problems, and then write an equation. They were amazing using the computers for their first Kindergarten assessment, which showed that 81% of students who took the test are at the 50th percentile or higher according to FLKRS (Florida Kindergarten Readiness Screener).

#### First Grade

As we near the end of the 1st quarter we are excited to dive into some of our most enjoyable standards in first grade! Our science standards have us investigating plants and their basic needs. How fun is it that we eat plants? The kids are enjoying watching the plants that we eat grow and the experiments we are having as we explore the basic needs of plants. In social studies we have visited our nation's monuments and we are able to recognize why they are important to us. We continue to work on being a good citizen as we learn about rights and responsibilities. For our ELA time we continue to work on short vowel sounds in phonics. We are diving deeper into comprehension and writing. Our 1st grade students scored 42% on comprehending literature during our iReady diagnostic. We are using discussion strategies as well as highlighting text and retelling to better our comprehension and get organized for writing. In Math, we are working on math stories using addition and subtraction. We are reading the students the math story as they work on circling important numbers and using the Read, Draw, Write strategy to solve it. Our days are packed with learning, so we are loving the time we get to enjoy the nice weather outside during recess. Happy Fall!



#### **2nd Grade!**

Our last Eureka Math Module on Measurement:

20% scored O, 63% scored S, 17% scored N

We are now moving into place value with Module 3. Students will be demonstrating the value of ones, tens, and hundreds and how they relate to each other. This will be moving into addition and subtraction using place value. We are finishing up Life Cycles in Science. In Reading, we have been focusing on text features and retelling stories with a focus on the lesson learned. In Social studies we continue to learn about citizenship at school, home, and the community.

### Fifth Grade

In ELA, students recently took the first iReady Diagnostic. The data from this assessment shows that 61% of students scored on or above grade level, 32% scored one grade level below, and 6% of students scored two or more grade levels below. This diagnostic is designed to help students, parents, and teachers to plan the best approach to improving literacy over the course of the year. In class, students have been working on literature standards, and will soon start learning and practicing essay writing based on informational texts.

In Science, students will begin learning about the water cycle and weather patterns as part of our study of Earth. Students also took a diagnostic to assess their knowledge of science from 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grade, which will help Mr. Comoletti to cover any gaps in knowledge.

Finally in math, students completed the iReady diagnostic, and the results show that 51% of 5<sup>th</sup> graders are on or above grade level. 44% of students are one grade level below, while only 4% are two or more grade levels below.

## 4th Grade!

October has begun with a focus on the Indian River Lagoon. Lagoon Loyal kicked off this unit with an interactive virtual presentation. From there, we have been using data, research articles, and engaging activities to continue our Lagoon focus in all subjects. We will participate in a virtual field trip with Lagoon Quest, a partnership of the Brevard Zoo, on October 16th. Mrs. Monroe is even having the students prepare a polished thank you letter to our Lagoon Quest representative in one of this month's Media standards – typing! Be sure to ask your student to share a few interesting tidbits about the Indian River Lagoon and how we can all become "Lagoonies" as we protect and rehabilitate this threatened and unique ecosystem. A culminating activity will be a science project involving mangrove propagules where we not only help them root, we will become an important part of the process when we replenish local mangrove forests.

On deck ... Science Fair (it will be virtual this year) and Mad Scientist Day. More details to come on those exciting topics. Lastly, our team has a fun, seasonal surprise planned for the students on the last day of school in October relating to October's in-class read-aloud novel. Show up to find out!!

During Media class, students in all grades have been learning about aspects of digital citizenship. In K-2, we've focused on media use balance right for each individual, while in the upper grades we've focused on safety and security. Grades 3-6 have started keyboarding skills which will be applied to assignments like letter and book review writing. Grades K-2 have been working on literacy skills such as sequencing, re-telling a story, comparing/contrasting and describing characters. # Literacy News



What is ELA anyway? English/Language Arts (ELA) is defined by the U.S. Common Core as the subject that "asks students to read stories and literature, as well as more complex texts that provide facts and background knowledge in areas such as science and social studies.

Students will be challenged and asked questions that push them to refer back to what they've read. This stresses critical-thinking, problem-solving, and analytical skills that are required for success in college, career, and life." With that being said, ELA also highlights the importance of the relationship between reading and writing. Some people like to think of it like the relationship between the chicken and the egg...not so much about which came first, but the idea that without one the other cannot exist. Likewise, literacy development is highly dependent on the interconnection of reading and writing.

Research has found that when children read extensively, they become better writers. Reading increases students' exposure to different text structures and language that they can transfer to their personal writing. In addition, reading exposes students to topics and information (prior knowledge) that they can write about or include in their stories.

At the same time, writing supports reading skills through phonemic awareness and phonics as younger children read and write words. For older children, creating writing pieces with varying structures supports them while reading texts from a variety of genres.

You can help your student develop the reading/writing connection through genre studies, utilizing mentor text to support specific writing styles, and encouraging student choice in reading and writing material and topics.

#### **Third Grade**

Third grade has been working hard, and is wrapping up the first nine weeks. In reading, we have been studying story structures and learning to use context clues to help us figure out words in our reading we don't know. During intervention, students have the opportunity to work on i-Ready to get lessons on the areas they specifically need. 85% of our students are passing their lessons with a 70% or higher.

We have been studying opinion writing topics such as using transition words, staying focused while writing and stating our opinion, and opinions others may have, in our writing.

In math we have finished our unit on multiplication and division. Please continue to work on multiplication facts at home to help strengthen fluency in math skills. We have begun a new unit this week on place value and problem solving with units of measure. In this module, students will explore measurement using kilograms, grams, liters, milliliters and intervals of time in minutes.

Our study of primary and secondary sources has led us to learning about the U.S. Constitution and the three branches of government. Students will continue to explore these topics over the next few weeks.

In science, we have learned about plant structures and their functions and now are


Here is the GSP Update!


