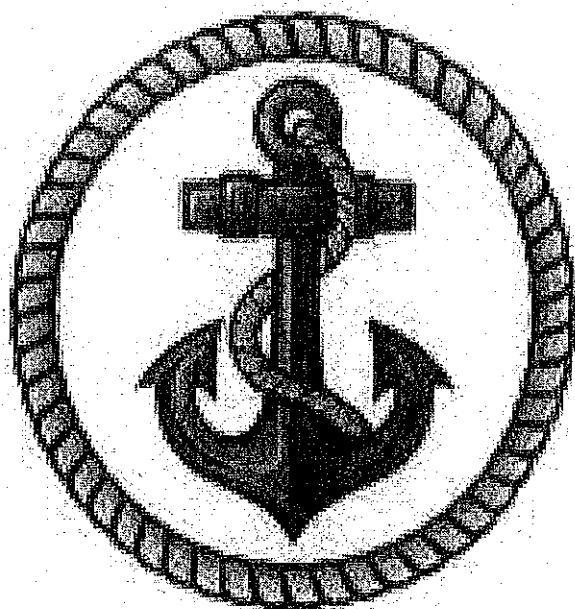

College and Career Planning Checklist

GRADE 11

Fall

- Obtain a social security number, if you do not have one, you will need it to apply for college and financial aid.
- Start to review your college and technical choices and make selections. Make a list of at least 10 colleges; you will want to apply to at least 3-6 in the fall of your senior year.
- Study for and sign up to take the **PSAT in October**. The PSAT is October 10, 2018. The registration fee is \$16.00. If you plan to ask for testing accommodations because of a disability, be sure your paperwork has been approved by the College Board. Check with your school counselor for details. **You must take the PSAT in 11th grade to qualify for the National Merit Scholarship Competition (NMSQT).**
- Attend the college fair at the Melbourne Auditorium October 25, 2018 from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Consider attending any other college fair opportunities, both locally and nationally.
- Attend financial aid night which will be held October 30, 2018 in the Media Center at EGHS from 5:30-6:30 p.m. to start learning about the FAFSA and the process of applying for financial aid.
- Students who plan to pursue Division 1 or Division II sports in college **must** apply for eligibility online through the NCAA Eligibility Center. <https://web1.ncaa.org/eligibilitycenter/common/> See your coach or athletic director for specific guidelines.

Spring

- Plan to take the ACT and SAT during the spring of your junior year.** All juniors at EGHS will take the SAT for free March 6, 2019. Please make sure to use Khan Academy as your Official SAT Practice resource. If you plan to ask for testing accommodations because of a disability, be sure your paperwork has been approved by the College Board. Check with your school counselor for details. *Consider retaking the ACT or SAT after you receive your score reports. Make sure to study before taking the test again for college admissions.*
- Begin to prepare your college essays. Start to think about your topics. Check the applications of your top colleges to find out if it is an open ended essay or one that asks you to write about yourself.
- Ask a teacher or counselor to write a recommendation that can be used for scholarships and college admissions at the beginning of your senior year. Provide the teacher or counselor your student resume.
- Start to check into scholarships and start thinking about how you will pay for college. You can join online scholarships searches such as www.fastweb.com
- If you haven't done so already, visit your top choice colleges and narrow down your choices by July.
- Use the internet to access the websites of colleges you will be applying to in the fall.

GRADE 12

Fall

- Make a list of all the things you need to do and the deadlines you need to meet during your senior year of high school. You'll be taking entrance exams, completing applications, paying fees, and much more.
- Review your coursework with your guidance counselor to be sure that you've taken (or are scheduled to take) all the courses you'll need for admission to your preferred colleges.
- Register for SAT or ACT if you would like to retake tests. If you are applying to schools that require subject area test scores, make sure you have completed those tests too!
- Continue to pursue extracurricular activities.
- Complete college forms and essays (as required) and submit them by the required deadlines. Many colleges now offer an online admission option; check college Websites for information.
- Be sure to keep copies of everything you send, so you can refer to or resend them later if you have to.

- If you've changed your list of schools you're applying to since you took the ACT® or SAT®, arrange to have your test scores forwarded to the colleges you're applying to.
- Visit the colleges you're most interested in attending. There's no substitute for actual experience. Try to connect with a current student so you can see what classes and dorm life are really like.
- October 1st** you can file for Bright Futures by going to Student Florida Financial Aid Application. All Florida Aid applicants must all file a FAFSA Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Winter

- File your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible. You can complete it online at <https://fafsa.ed.gov/> or fill out a printed form and mail it. You'll need information from your parents' tax return to complete the application, so ask them to file early.
- After your application has been reviewed, you'll be able to view your Student Aid Report (SAR) online. This will include your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The EFC is a number used by schools to calculate how much you'll be expected to pay for college, as well as the amount of federal student aid you may be eligible for.
- Send your transcripts to the colleges you're applying to by putting in a transcript request form and paying \$1.00 per transcript.
- Boys who are 18 years or older must be registered for Selective Service to receive student financial aid.
- Complete scholarship applications.

Spring

- Watch your mailbox or email because many colleges announce acceptance decisions between February and April. If you can, make one last visit to each of the schools you're accepted to. Once you make your decision, be sure to return your acceptance letter by the deadline (usually the beginning of May) to save your spot.
- Student financial aid letters usually arrive by the beginning of May. If you need additional funding, it's not too late to apply for a student loan.
- Submit your tuition deposit to the college you've chosen. Be sure to get it on time (typically early in May). A late payment could jeopardize your admission.
- Request your **final** transcripts from the school guidance office. If you are NCAA Eligible, make sure you also request your final transcript be sent to the NCAA, as well as your college.

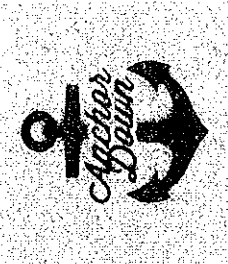
Summer

AICE Diploma Tracking Guide

Students vying for the AICE Diploma must take one course from the three subject Groups 1-3 AND the CORE AS Level Global Perspectives. Students may choose three additional courses from any of the four named Groups. Only two points may come from Group 4. Students must pass the subject examinations offered in May/June of that school year in order to earn points towards their AICE Diploma. Seven points are required for the accomplishment of the AICE Diploma.

Parent's Overview of Financial Aid

Does the expense of higher education make it seem out of reach for your teen? There are many ways to support college and any other postsecondary option that your teen may choose. Financial aid is available to every Floridian. It can help pay for training beyond high school and make even the most expensive school affordable. Before you start exploring the options for financial aid, there are a few things you need to know:

- Financial aid money comes from state and federal governments, banks, the schools themselves, and private donors.
- You must apply for financial aid. It is not part of the school's admission process.
- Aid is based on a variety of factors, including family income, tuition, academic skill, etc.

Financial Aid Myths

College Is Just Too Expensive. While it is true that college costs are rising, it is a good investment for the future. All postsecondary education, not just a college education, is the ticket to good career opportunities. Your teen can make a big contribution toward the cost of college by making good grades while in high school. Good grades can help them to qualify for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.

We Make Too Much to Qualify for Aid. Aid is intended to make college affordable for students in a variety of financial situations. Financial aid administrators take into account not only income but also other family members in college, home mortgage costs, and other expenses. Aid is awarded to many families who thought they earned too much money. Also consider low-interest loans and have your teen apply for scholarships based on academic achievement, talent, merit or other criteria.

I'm not a Straight "A" Student, so I Won't Get Aid. Most scholarships consider grades, but most awards of federal aid are based on financial need.

Private Schools Are Out of Reach for My Student. The key is to pick schools that meet educational, career, and personal needs. Then consider cost. While private schools are more expensive than public schools, the family contribution expected is the same. So higher school expenses also mean a better chance of demonstrating financial need.

Types of Financial Aid

Scholarships (Free Money) – Assistance based on academic performance and/or financial need. This money does not have to be repaid. The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program has several award levels which can pay as much as 100 percent of tuition and fees at a Florida public institution and an equivalent amount at a private institution. Students can visit www.FACTS.org for a comparison of their transcripts with Bright Futures academic requirements.

Grants (Free Money) – Financial aid that does not have to be repaid. The grant amount is based on need, cost of attendance, and enrollment status.

Loans – A low interest loan that does not accrue interest or require payment until after the student leaves school, for example: Federal Stafford Loan, Federal Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS), Federal Consolidated Loan.

Work-study – Money earned through part-time employment while attending a postsecondary school. Students work up to 20 hours a week during the academic year.

Private Aid – Financial assistance from a private business or other organization. Many Fortune 500 companies provide aid to students.

Special Aid – Aid for special groups of students, such as veterans, minorities, handicapped, etc. The Federal Department of Veteran's Affairs provides funds for training veterans.

Timing is Everything!

Early planning and research is critical to finding sources of financial aid. Admission applications should be sent in as early as October or November of your teen's senior year. Applications for federal aid should be submitted in January. Other scholarships may have different application deadlines. Most students who receive aid get a combination, put together in a financial aid "package" by the financial aid office at the school or college they have chosen. High school counselors are also knowledgeable about financial aid and can help students put together applications for a variety of scholarships.

- Students must earn a Florida standard high school diploma or go Early Admission the senior year.
- Initial Eligibility Requirements must be met prior to graduation from a Florida public high school or a registered FDOE private high school.
- Students seeking state scholarships must complete a Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) during their senior year of high school before graduation.
